<u>Maths</u>

O LO: Can I complete the Fraction Friday assessment/task bundle on Sumdog? O LO: Can I develop my problem solving skills by solving a maths problem?

If you did not get chance to complete the Fraction Friday assessment task/fraction task bundle in the lesson on Friday, you can take the time in the lesson today to complete these challenges. If you completed the Sumdog challenge above, then attempt the problem solving activity below:

Read the clues below. Can you draw a plan view of the chocolates in the box?

- The second row has 3 chocolates and the third just 2
- The space for the Lemon Twist touches the bottom of the space for Turkish delight
- Delightful Chocolates are sold in triangular boxes that have just one layer
- The two chocolates with nuts are next to each other
- There are ten chocolates altogether
- There is a mixture of dark and light chocolates
- There are four rows of chocolate in the box
- The Truffle Delight is in a row on its own
- The first row is at the base of the triangle and has four chocolates in it
- The Creamy Caramel is in the centre of a row
- Strawberry Fizz and Lemon Twist are in the same row as Creamy Caramel
- Coconut Heaven is in the row that has half the number of chocolates as the bottom row
- The spaces for Turkish Delight, Truffle Delight, Lemon Twist and Hazelnut Crackle all touch the right hand side of the box

O LO: Can I edit and improve the stanzas that I wrote as an alternative ending to The Highwayman?

Look back at the new stanzas you wrote yesterday. A very important part of writing poetry (and writing in general) is that we proofread so we can understand where we need to edit our work to improve it and make it a stronger piece. Consider the points below when reading and editing your stanzas:

- Think about the rhyme scheme you have used. Which words rhyme at the end of each line? Which words could you find synonyms for to make them more powerful in your writing? Can you keep the rhyme there if you do this?
- Think about where the characters were in the poem before the stanzas you have written. Have you carried on their story carefully, mentioning all the characters that were involved?

<u>Friday</u> <u>PE</u> O LO: Can I practice my ball skills in rugby?

I have written a description of a mini-game below that you could try to play with family at home to practice your rugby skills.

Tag:

This game is designed for two people to play. One person holds the ball and is attempting to get it to the opposite side. The other person has to try and tag them once to stop them from doing it.

The person holding the ball must run whilst holding it. The focus of this game is on dodging your opponent. Think about how you could move with the ball to avoid being tagged. This game is designed to help you practice being light on your feet.

As you work on this task with your partner, continue to swap roles. Think about how you could also make the task more challenging for you and your partner.
