Poetry devices

This is a term to describe all the tools and techniques that a poet will use then they are righting a poem. We looked at **rhythm and rhyme** yesterday. These are devices that we use to make the poem more fun to read and listen too.

Today we will find out about **onomatopoeia**.

- Did your alarm clock **BEEP** this morning?
- Did you SLAM your bedroom door when you came downstairs?
- Did you CRACK an egg for your breakfast or RIP open a new packet of cereal?

These sentences all use **onomatopoeia** to make them more fun and interesting! Onomatopoeia means using words that sound like the thing they are describing. They are sound words.
