Main

Watch the video input for the lesson today and read the first page of guidance below on expanded noun phrases to recap your knowledge.

Expanded Noun Phrases

Bird

flew across the plain.

Add words before the noun:

One bird One small bird Just one small bird flew across the plain. flew across the plain. flew across the plain.

Add words after the noun:

One bird with a large beak One bird with a large colourful beak flew across the plain.

flew across the plain.

Or you can do both at once:

Just one small bird with a large colourful beak flew across the plain.

Man	had a dream.
A man	had a dream.
An old man	had a dream.
An old man with a small house	had a dream.

An old man with a small house surrounded by awful rubbish had a dream.

Note that there are noun phrases (a small house, awful rubbish) within the longer noun phrase. The chief word (head noun) is still man as a small house and awful rubbish would not have a dream.

Work through this example together: House standing in the windswept place.
