

- A small documentary on a topic you have researched
- Any other ideas you can make work at home

Safe handling

When you are using a device, it is important to look after it.

What top tips should we have for the safe handling of equipment and devices?

Technique 1: Static camera

Key points:

- The camera is fixed in position
- A tripod or stand may be used
- Examples: a newsreader or a weather forecaster

Why is this a useful technique?



Technique 2: Zooming

Key points:

- This allows for close-up video so you can see the subject in greater detail
- Using too much zoom may mean that the subject is blurry

Why is this a useful technique?



Technique 3: Pan and tilt

Key points:

- Pan: The camera position may be fixed, but it is able to move freely from left to right
- Tilt: The camera position may be fixed, but it is able to move freely up and down
- This is useful when you want to follow a subject, for example a running animal, or someone playing a game



Why is this a useful technique?
