- Spellings will be given to pupils every Tuesday and tested on the following Monday so they have the weekend to help learn them. Please encourage your child to complete their 'look, say, cover, write, check' grid and write a minimum of 3 interesting, extended sentences in their spelling homework books, using words from their list and a range of punctuation. The children can also use their spelling work books as a place to practice their times tables for their weekly test.
- All pupils have a copy of their Sumdog logins in the front inside page of their spelling homework books to allow them to access times tables and general maths practice at
 home. When an optional task becomes available, a notice will be written on the weekly spelling lists. Please get in touch if you or your child are unable to access their Sumdog
 login.
- Children will require their PE bags in school all week including a pair of socks. PE sessions for Class 4 are timetabled to take place every Monday and Thursday.
- Please actively encourage your child to learn the multiplication tables thoroughly, as sound knowledge will help their confidence in many areas of mathematics.
